Lisbon Historical Society Quarterly Notes

Spring is on the horizon and as sure as another storm or two is expected, our long snowy winter is coming to an end. While we grow weary of shoveling and plowing, snow removal in the country during the 18th and 19th centuries was not a big deal. In fact keeping packed snow on dirt roads was an asset to farmers traveling by horse-drawn sleds. The community's snow warden had the task of keeping the road smooth by packing and filling in melt and bare spots, this was done by using snow rollers pulled by oxen, or dragging

the road with a heavy log. Often, winter roads were in better shape than the same road the rest of the year. Come spring, off came the sleigh runners, replaced with wagon wheels until the next snowfall.

Last fall the Historical Society invested in a modern fix to keep the chill of winter at bay. New Plexiglas storm windows were installed over the John Bishop House's 32 windows. Each window had to be custom fit, but we expect the investment will pay off in lower heating costs. Winter work on the Bishop House roof while ready to commence, was deferred until more cooperative weather arrives in the spring.

Many of you might have noticed the green candles in the windows of the JBH, as well as green lights in the synagogue and adorning the bushes in front of the town hall. The Last Green Valley initiated The Green Light Campaign in an effort to communicate the organization's efforts to unify resources and that will preserve and protect our collective natural resources. The Last Green Valley stretches across the 35 towns in northeastern Connecticut and south central Massachusetts, its mission, programs and opportunities to support the region can be found on their website, www.tlgv.org.

Our thanks go out the town Public Works crew for donating the downed tree to the Bishop House. Once cut and split the wood will get us through several seasons of hearth cooking demonstrations and classes, and school field trips.

There are several times during the year that can and bottle drop-offs peak and one beverage is the most popular for that event. The week after the Super Bowl is

one of those times. This year's can and bottle Super Bowl winner is Mike's Hard Limeade (might that have something to do with the green label?), Sam Adams, any flavor was runner up. Thank you to all our can and bottle donors, we hope your team took home the trophy.

Summer News Letter

I need to make a correction to my spring letter about my discussion regarding the tunnel that was filled in when the new 169 south highway was completed in the early 1960's. The tunnel was an overpass for the railroad and the cars drove through it. I hope to observe it this spring before the new spring growth comes in and obstructs the view of the car underpass. The location of the stone bridge is along Kendall Road but cannot be seen from the road.

How will you celebrate Memorial Day and the 4th of July? Will you have a picnic, see a parade, listen to patriotic music, visit a cemetery, anticipate the fireworks display or participate in another means of celebration? On July 4, 1826, fifty years after the Declaration of Independence was signed there was a celebration in Lisbon. It was held at the home of John Brown of Lisbon and Elijah Rose was the parade marshal with the church choir signing along the way from the Brown home to the Newent Church. Ebenezer Potter read the Declaration of Independence, speeches were made, and the ceremony was closed by music from the band. The location of John Brown's home is unknown at present but must have been near the church as they walked to it.

The procession then returned to the Church where erected on the high ground, east of the meeting-house, were tables tastefully furnished with the bounties of nature. Ezra Bingham acted as the President and Lester Hyde as the Vice President. The toasts were enlivened by the social glass, and the melody of instruments and the laughter of the persons attending the event. When the meal and entertainment were completed it is noted that "they returned to John Brown's hospitable mansion without one accident to mar the unity, festivity, and happiness of the day."

Some of the comments of the day were-"While from this eminence, scenes of luxuriant festivity and social happiness meet our views, may we not forget these who by their exertions have secured us to these blessings." Another comment was "May the influence of his example (George Washington) be the terror of tyrants and may the immense temple of freedom which he has erected, forever remain an asylum for the oppressed." A comment from the Fair Daughters of America "May they ever shine as a bright constellation in the sphere where nature has placed them."

As we salute our soldiers in all branches of the military currently on active duty protecting our freedom and democracy, please also take time to reflect on the freedom we have and say thank you to the veterans who have fought in past wars. Salute them for their sacrifices in pursuit of our freedom and way of life. Wave Old Glory with pride and honor to all who serve and have served, whether on the front lines or behind the scenes.

Thomas Jefferson, the second President of the United States, died on July 4, 1826, the fiftieth anniversary of the Declaration of Independence, as well as John Adams, the second President of the United States, and the father of John Quincy Adams, the sixth President of the United States.

Planning and Zoning Commission Quarterly Notes

The much anticipated Aldi grocery store held its grand opening on Thursday, May 19th. Lowe's held their Contractor's Day, and Friends & Family Day the same week with the grand opening scheduled on the 26th. Both retailers are welcome additions to the neighborhood and the town's grand list.

The only space left to be developed at *The Crossing at Lisbon* is a pad next to the Aldi store.

Dick's Sporting Goods site plan and elevations were approved several months ago and construction has begun at their site next to O'Neil Cinema. Work has also begun on the Michael's space. Kohl's renewed its commitment and investment in Lisbon Landing with the remodeling of their entryways and retail space.

During the quarter, the Commission approved an amendment to the excavation regulations that allow ponds under certain conditions. A pond can be an aesthetic asset that adds property value, enhances or creates wildlife habitat, and is often a necessary component to farming operations. The new regulation requires that ponds be designed and constructed by a Licensed Professional Civil Engineer in accordance with *USDA Natural Resource Conservation Service Handbook 590-Ponds Planning, Design & Construction*. The handbook can be accessed and downloaded from www.in.nrcs.usda.gov.

The regular meetings of the Commission take place in town hall at 7:00 p.m. on the first Tuesday of each month. Public Hearings on applications before the Commission are noticed in the Norwich Bulletin under "Legals" twice (1 & 2 wks. before the hearing).

Town of Lisbon Revaluation

Representatives from the Lisbon Assessor's office are performing the State mandated revaluation for the Grand List of October 1, 2011. Home inspections throughout town will be ongoing for the next six months. While it is almost impossible to inspect the interior of every house in town, there will be an inspection of the property. The State of Connecticut requests an inspection at least once every ten years so not all houses will need a physical inspection. We have entered enough homes in the past ten years to satisfy the standard the State has set. There will be random inspections for quality control purposes.

We will be collecting the data necessary to establish the new assessments required by State Statute. However, it is important to note that these assessments will not be computed and finalized until November 2011 and will not be effective until the tax bill of July 2012.

Fall Festival Schedule

This year's Lisbon Fall Festival activities will encompass two weekends, according to decisions recently voted by the Lisbon Fall Festival/Community Center Committee. Discussions centered around offering activities that would appeal to various age groups.

The Lisbon Meadows Park Community Center (also known as "The Barn") will be the site of a Community Bingo Night on Friday evening, September 9th and a Guitar Hero competition on Saturday, September 10th.

A youth dance for Lisbon Central grades 6 through 8 will have the Center jumping on Friday evening, September 16th. The annual road race will kick off from in front of the Town Hall on the morning of Saturday,

September 17th, while registrations will be taken and results posted in the Community Center. Later in the day, a classic car cruise is being planned for Lisbon Meadows Prk. A portion of the Community Center parking lot will be set up as a food court, featuring chowder and fritters in the late afternoon as well as hotdogs and hamburgers throughout the afternoon.

More detail on these events will be made available via posters and flyers in late summer. In the meantime, the Community Center is seeking additional use for family and community events such as birthday and welcome home parties, baby and wedding showers, and activities by Lisbon non-profit and municipal organizations. The committee's website, lisbonfallfestival.org, has details about use of the Center. The cost to reserve the Center is a \$50 donation to the Heat Fund and a \$50 refundable deposit to cover the possible cost of additional cleaning following the event. Since the building is currently unheated, the Heat Fund was established to cover the cost of insulation and a heating system, hopefully without any additional cost to the taxpayers through town funding.
