Important Messages from the Registrar of Voters and The Assessor's Office

Registrar of Voters:

2020 Presidential Primary — Important Deadlines *By Mary Grant, Registrar of Voters*

March 14, 2020—Absentee ballots for military and overseas voters become available (45 day ballot).

April 7, 2020—Absentee Ballots become available.

April 23, 2020—Deadline for new voters, and for unaffiliated voters, to enroll in a party for voting in its primary. For new voters, mail-in applications must be postmarked, or received by Registrar of Voters or Voter Registration Agency, by this date. For unaffiliated voters, the mail-in application must be received (not merely postmarked) by the Registrar of Voters by this deadline. (See exception below for in-person enrollment).

April 27, 2020—In-person enrollment deadline, for new voters and unaffiliated voters enrolling in a party in person at Town Hall, for voting in a primary. (**12:00 noon deadline**)

April 28, 2020—Presidential Preference Primary. Polls open 6:00 AM and close at 8:00 PM. Voting will be held in both districts (Town Hall and Senior Center).

Other Important Voter Information

In May, after the Town Meetings, the Budget Referendum, will be scheduled for the Town's residents to vote on the 2020/2021 Budget. Both districts vote in the Town Hall ONLY, and polls are open from 6:00 AM to 8:00 PM.

As a reminder, the **Regular State Primary** is held on August 11, 2020 (polls open from 6:00 AM—8:00 PM); **Presidential Election—Federal and State**, is held on November 3, 2020. Polls are open 6:00 AM—8:00 PM.

Assessor's Office:

Tax Relief and Inspections *By Angel Johnstone, Tax Assessor*

Homeowner's Tax Relief:

Applications are currently being accepted for the **Senior and Disabled** homeowner's tax relief program at the Assessor's Office. To qualify, homeowners must be over 65 or totally disabled by Social Security AND have a qualifying income equal to or less than \$45,100 for married couples or \$37,000 for individuals. The program opens on February 1st and closes on May 15th each year and requires documentation of your income eligibility including tax returns, social security statements and other statements of all income sources. **Veterans** meeting these income guidelines or those deemed fully disabled by the Veterans Administration may be eligible for additional benefits. Please contact the Assessor's office for more details.

Assessor Inspections:

Inspections of properties happen throughout the year but are more concentrated in the Spring and Fall months. The Assessor's Office strives to maintain updated records and periodically inspects/reviews properties at random to ensure equity and accuracy. Inspections are also done in response to building permits, sales listings, farm programs, benefit programs, etc. Should you have questions on inspections or desire to schedule one for your property, feel free to contact the Assessor at: **860-376-5115.**

Farmers' Market

A Message from the Market Manager By Amanda Moreno, Market Manager

The Lisbon Farmers' Market is happy to announce that we will once again be a FMNP Certified market for the 2020 season. The Department of Agriculture administers two separate nutrition programs at authorized Connecticut Farmers' Markets, including Lisbon — the Connecticut Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) FMNP and the Connecticut Senior (S) FMNP. Both programs provide low-income individuals with checks for the purchase of fresh Connecticut Grown produce and cut herbs directly from farmers at FMNP authorized farmers' markets from July 1 to October 31. Eligible seniors can also use their SFMNP checks to purchase Connecticut Grown honey at FMNP authorized farmers' markets. All our vendors who fall under the fresh produce and cut herbs categories will be certified to accept these checks.

As of this writing, vendors currently lined up for the 2020 season are: Grant's Berry Patch (fruits & vegetables), Johnny Bgood Garlic (garlic & cut flowers); BZB Farm (meat & poultry); Country Comfort Cooking (baked goods); Freak of Nature (soap); Rural Heritage Arts (canned goods, pickles & jams); Swampy Acres Farm (beef, pork, eggs, vegetables); Standish Brook Farm (breads & sweets); Dove Hill Farm (produce, canned goods and farm crafts); and Busy Bee Sustainable Kitchen Ware (sustainable food wrap). We anticipate as many as 30+ vendors again this season.

The market is currently accepting vendor applications for the 2020 season. We welcome CT Grown and Produced vendors from the region, including produce, meats, cheeses, baked goods, potted plants and cut flowers, canned goods (pickles, jams, honey and maple syrup), herbs, crafts, food trucks, nonprofits and local services. competition. Everyone is looking forward to spring sports and warm weather! Our student athletes and their coaches do a great job representing our small town.



From The History Books

Immigration in Early America



In my last article (Winter 2019), I wrote about early colonial settlers who came from England in the 1600's and some of the difficulties they had to overcome. The length of the trip from Great Britain, lack of healthy food, poor living conditions, and diseases related to close contact with people who became ill on the voyage, made these voyages dangerous. A diary from a German who came to America in 1750 described the travel conditions: old meat that was highly salted for preservation; stagnant drinking water; no fruits or vegetables, which resulted in passengers getting scurvy; prolonged hunger and thirst; and extreme heat, cold and damp conditions. Head lice was rampant; seasickness with serious nausea and vomiting occurred, as did anxiety and depression. He also described a constant fear of the ship sinking during storms and gales.

Childbirth was very dangerous on board a ship. There was little to no privacy, no obstetric equipment, no clean linen and water to spare, and generally no available beds. Women gave birth on the floor or deck of the ship. Many women and their children did not survive the trip. Women that did not survive childbirth were cast into the sea along with the baby if it did not survive. It was noted that children from ages one to seven rarely survived travel on board due to hunger, thirst and illnesses. Their bodies were also cast into the water.

Some people traveled to the New America as indentured

servants, where a contract or legal document bound them into the service of another for a specified amount of time.

Basic necessities of food, clothing, and housing were provided during their term of indenture but they did not get any wages.

Indentured servitude would come about when a person, husband and wife or a complete family sailed without paying before they sailed. Once in America, those who lived here and could afford to pay the fee for the people arriving determined how long a person needed to work to pay off their debt. Often they were bound for 3 to 6 years. Those between the ages of 10 and 15 were required to serve until they were 21.

There were generally 3 types, or classes, of indentured servants: 1) Willing migrants that would sign papers; 2) Unwilling migrants that were trying to escape religious persecution or similar situations; 3) Convicts, vagabonds, and undesirables who chose indentured servitude in New England instead of prison in their own countries. In this case, the length of indentureship was 5 to 7 years.

Many parents had to sell or trade their children so that the travel debt could be paid. Often, parents never knew where their children went. If a spouse or parent died at sea better than halfway through the voyage, the survivor(s) had to pay or serve their own debt as well as the debt of the deceased. Once their indentured terms were served, they received a new set of clothes; the men would also get a horse and women received a cow. Men were listed as a "freeman" and were allowed to vote. (Women, of course, did not have the privilege of the vote until 1920, with the ratification of the 19th Amendment to the Constitution).

At the time, there were many ports along the eastern coast of the New America, established not only as a means of receiving immigrants, but to both send goods grown and manufactured in the colonies over seas, and to receive goods grown and manufactured in the Old World. In 1668, a wharf was established at Yantic Cove. Settlement was primarily in the three-mile area around the Norwichtown Green. The sixty -nine founding families soon divided up the land in the Norwichtown vicinity as farms and businesses. By 1694, the public landing built at the head of the Thames River allowed ships to offload goods at the harbor area known as the Chelsea neighborhood. Over time, however, as the New World was able to produce more, we relied less on goods form overseas, and ports all along the coast started to close.

In the next newsletter I plan to write about becoming a U.S. citizen and the prolonged, costly process of Naturalization.

Cans and Bottles: Recently Ken Mahler, who administers and organizes the can and bottle program, made redemption trips to Norwich and Woodstock. Better Valu and Aldi. Ken reminds that as long as CT is somewhere on the label, the bottle, or can is redeemable. However, Poland Springs water bottles with the red strip around the label, Gatorade, Snapple, tea beverages, wine bottles, plastic milk jugs, and all others that do not have CT in the list of states are recyclable and should be disposed of in your home blue bin for weekly pickup. Additionally, it is impossible for the bar code readers at the redemption centers to process crushed aluminum cans and plastic bottles. We do our best to pop bottles back in to shape but those we cannot, and the crushed cans, subsequently end up in the recycling bins and over the year that amounts to a lot of lost nickels. Many thanks go out to contributors to our can and bottle redemption program.
