# An Important Message from the Tax Assessor's Office

Supplemental Motor Vehicle Bills will be sent out in late December for all vehicles registered at DMV between October 2nd, 2018 and August of 2019. These bills are calculated based on the number of months of ownership within that timeframe. Assessment credit for the prior ownership of another vehicle on the same license plate is also deducted, if applicable. Motor Vehicle values are obtained primarily by using NADA "clean retail" values published annually. For specialty vehicles, other valuation guides may be used. With proof of vehicle disposal and proof of plate cancellation, motor vehicle assessments may be prorated to the last month of ownership. All other changes to motor vehicle assessments, including mileage and condition adjustments, must be presented to the Board of Assessment Appeals.

Real Estate Assessment Notices for all properties where the assessment has increased by over \$100 will be mailed out between December and February. Properties that have had permit or other work done recently or had changes in land size by deed or survey are typically the properties to see such an increase. Information will be included in the notice on how to review the changes with the Assessor and/or appeal final values to the Board of Assessment Appeals in Spring of 2020.

Personal Property Assessment Notices for all business and personal property will be mailed between February and March 2020. This notice will include the statutory 25% assessment penalty for non-filed/late/incomplete accounts. Business property is priced new and then depreciated on a schedule ap proved by the State of CT Office of Policy & Management.

Unregistered motor vehicles such as campers, farm and work trucks, construction & farming equipment, vehicles registered elsewhere that are stored in Lisbon, ATV's and other recreational vehicles may also be classified as personal property and valued using the same standards as motor vehicles but may not be prorated for disposal within the tax year. The Board of Assessment Appeals will hear assessment change requests on personal property in Spring 2020.

### **Important Voter Information**

2020 Presidential Primary — Important Deadlines

**January 28, 2020**—Deadline for enrolled party members to transfer enrollment from one party to the other, for voting in their "New" party's presidential primary.

**March 14, 2020**—Absentee ballots for military and overseas voters become available (45 day ballot).

April 7, 2020—Absentee Ballots become available.

April 23, 2020—Deadline for new voters, and for unaffiliated voters, to enroll in a party for voting in its primary. For new voters, mail-in applications must be postmarked, or received by Registrar of Voters or voter registration agency, by this date. For unaffiliated voters, the mail-in application must be received (not merely postmarked) by the Registrar of Voters by this deadline. (See exception below for in-person enrollment).

**April 27, 2020**—In-person enrollment deadline, for new voters and unaffiliated voters enrolling in a party in person at Town Hall, for voting in a primary.

**April 28, 2020**—Presidential Preference Primary. Polls open 6 AM to 8 PM.

## From The History Books

# The Angel Gabriel and the Great Colonial Hurricane

Do you know where your family originally came from? When and why did they come to this country? Did they land along the eastern coast after a long sea voyage? Or did they come by train, wagon, or even airplane? Was the incentive to come here based on economic or political reasons? Were your ancestors among the very rich, or the very poor?

One of the first ships to land in the New World with people who eventually settled in Lisbon, Connecticut, was documented in a book entitled "The wreck of the Angel Gabriel in 1635". The Angel Gabriel was a 240-ton galleon. She was very similar to the Mayflower, but eighteen feet longer. Captain Robert Andrews of Norwich, England, was owner and master of the ship.


Sailing from Bristol, England, on June 4, 1635, the Angel Gabriel, in a ramada with four other ships (the James, the Elizabeth (Bess), the Mary and the Diligence), reached Pemaquid Point, Maine on August 14, 1635. She made anchor and set ashore many of the passengers for the night. A storm later known as "The Great Colonial Hurricane" struck the area and the Angel Gabriel was torn from her anchors and destroyed. According to the ship's log of the James and the journal of Increase Mather, whose father Richard Mather and family were on the James, the following was recorded: "At this moment,... their lives were given up for lost; but then, in an instant of time, God turned the wind about, which carried them from the rocks of death before their eyes. ...her (James) sails rent in sunder, and split in pieces, as if they had been rotten ragges..."

All who were left aboard the Angel Gabriel for the night had perished. The survivors who had been put ashore that night eventually departed Pemaquid for towns in northeastern Massachusetts and southern New Hampshire. Although searches have been conducted for the wreck, no physical evidence of the ship has yet been found. The smaller, faster ships, the Mary, the Bess, and the Diligence, had managed to outrun the storm, and landed in Newfoundland on 15 August 1635. All one hundred-plus passengers aboard the James

In August 2010, many of these descendants gathered to dedicate a bronze plaque at Colonial Pemaquid commemorating the wreck of the Angel Gabriel on its 375th Anniversary.

**Cans and Bottles:** Many thanks go out to contributors to our can and bottle redemption program. Ken Mahler, who administers and organizes the can and bottle program, says that as

long as CT is somewhere on the label, the bottle, or can is redeemable. Poland Springs water bottles with the red strip around the label, Gatorade, Snapple, tea beverages, wine bottles, plastic milk jugs, and all others that do not have CT in the list of states are recyclable and should be disposed of in your home blue bin for weekly pickup. Additionally, it is impossible for the bar code readers at the redemption centers to process crushed aluminum cans and plastic bottles. We do our best to pop bottles back in to shape but those we cannot, and the crushed cans, subsequently end up in the recycling bins and over the year that amounts to a lot of lost nickels.

Brrr, the days are short, and with frosty winds, winter is upon us. Did you know that the oldest pair of ice skates known, dating back to about 3000 B.C., was found at the bottom of a lake in Switzerland. During the Middle Ages, both men and women skated on the canals of the Netherlands and the first skating club was established in Edinburgh in 1742.

The 19<sup>th</sup> century saw the introduction of the sports of speed and figure skating. In 1848 E. W. Bushnell of Philadelphia, PA invented the first all iron ice skate that could be clipped onto a boot and in 1865, famous American skater, Jackson Haines developed the two plate all metal blade. Leather heel skates on were found in the JBH attic and a pair of badly corroded skates were unearthed while excavating the carriage shed foundation.
